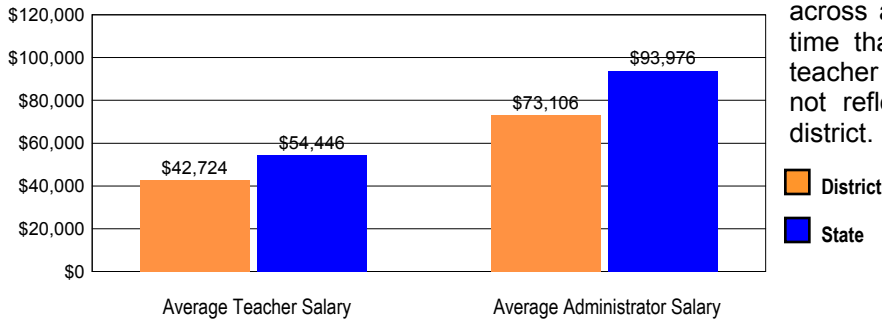

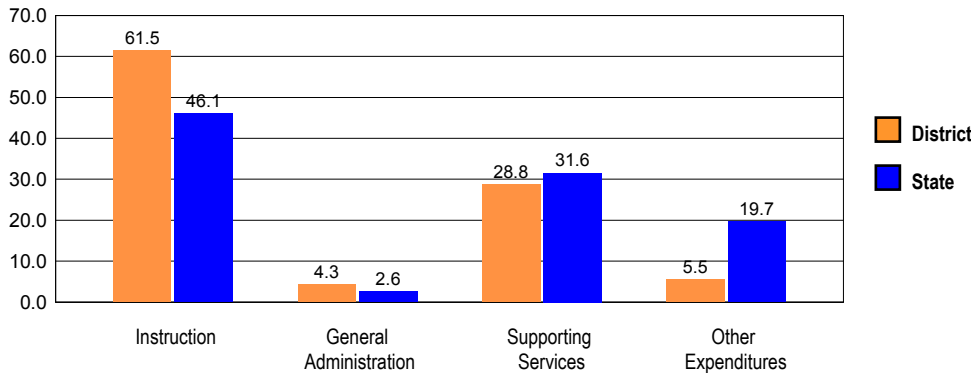
SCHOOL DISTRICT FINANCES

EXPENDITURE BY FUNCTION 2002-03 (Percentages)



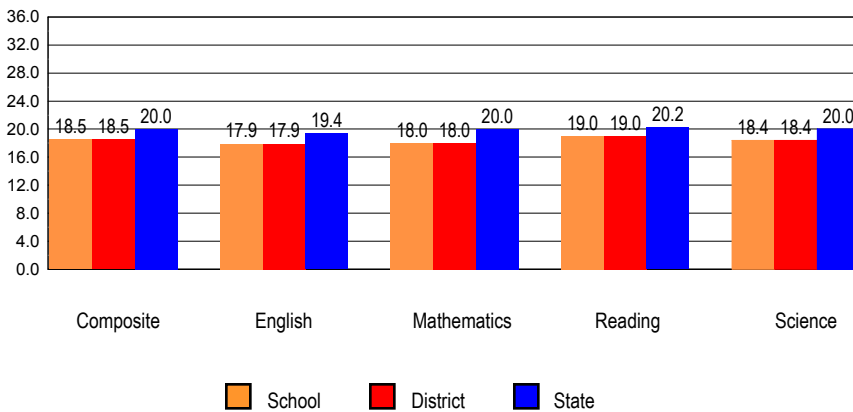

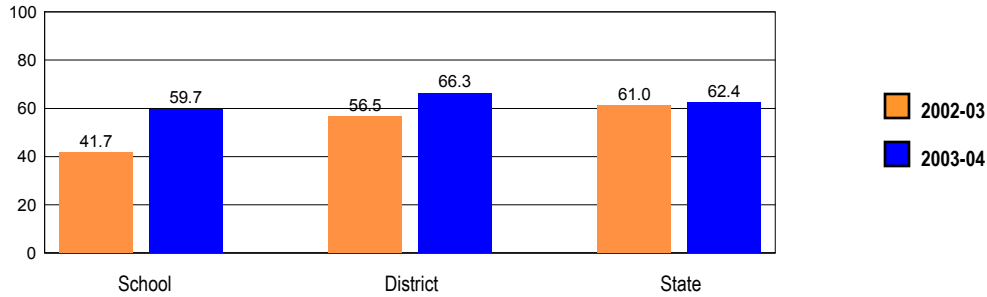

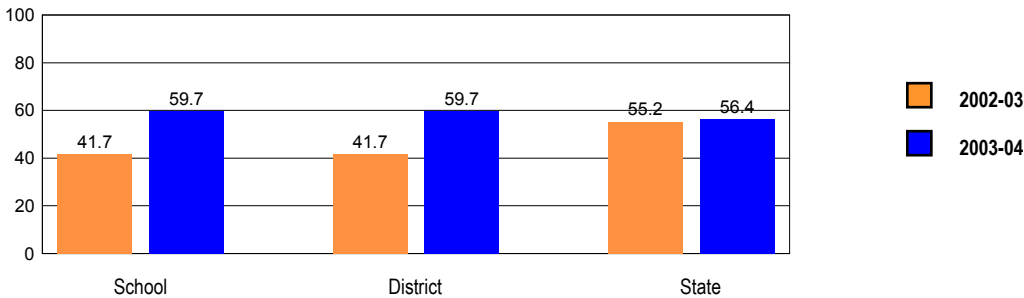
OVERALL STUDENT PERFORMANCE

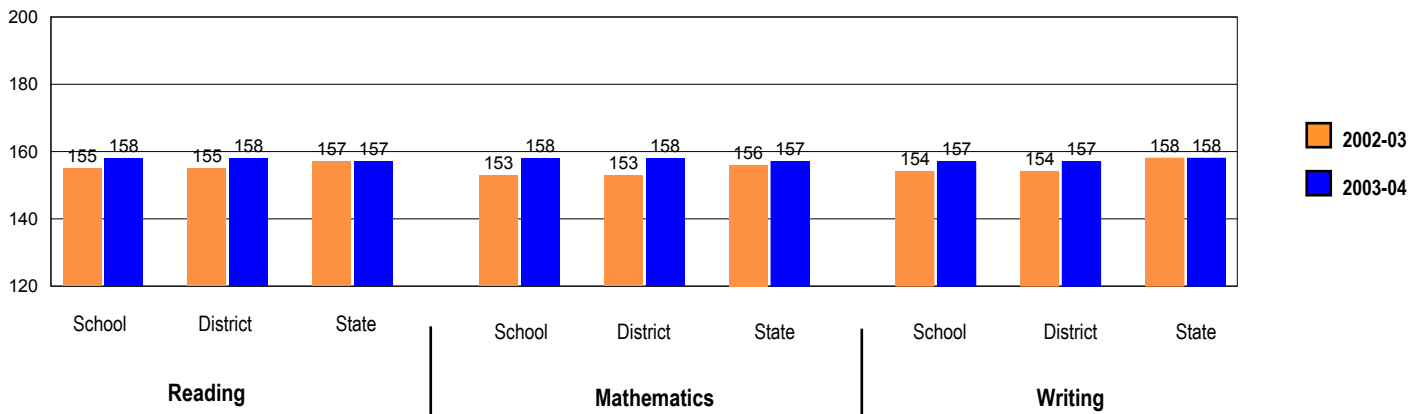
OVERALL PERFORMANCE - ALL STATE TESTS



OVERALL PRAIRIE STATE ACHIEVEMENT EXAMINATION (PSAE) PERFORMANCE

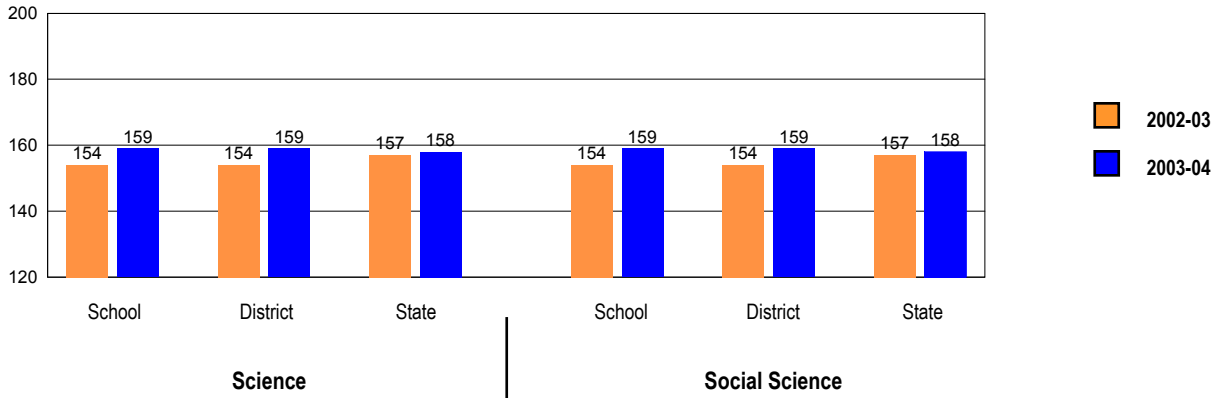


PRAIRIE STATE ACHIEVEMENT EXAMINATION (PSAE) - Average Scores



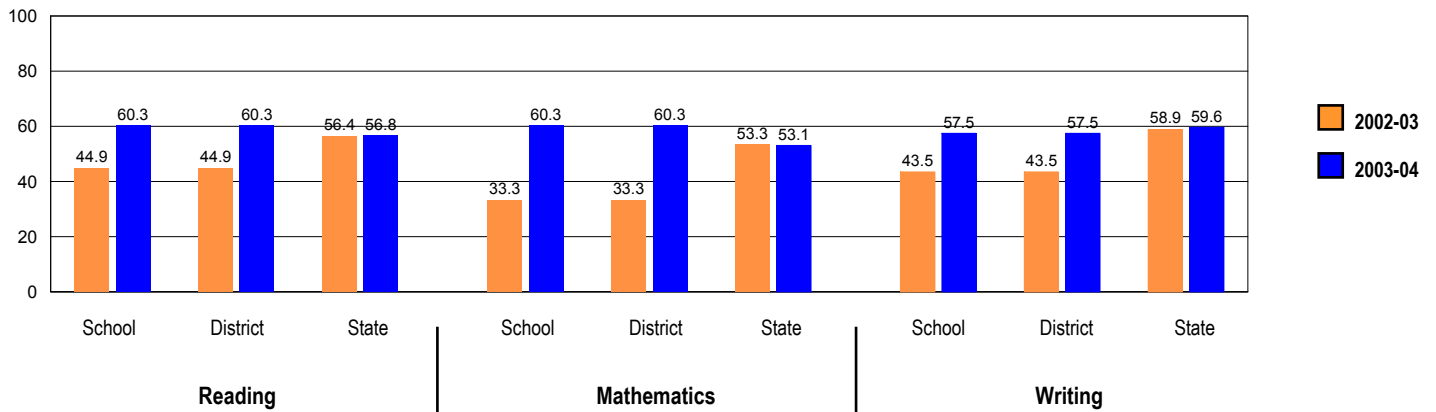

PRAIRIE STATE ACHIEVEMENT EXAMINATION (PSAE) - Average Scores



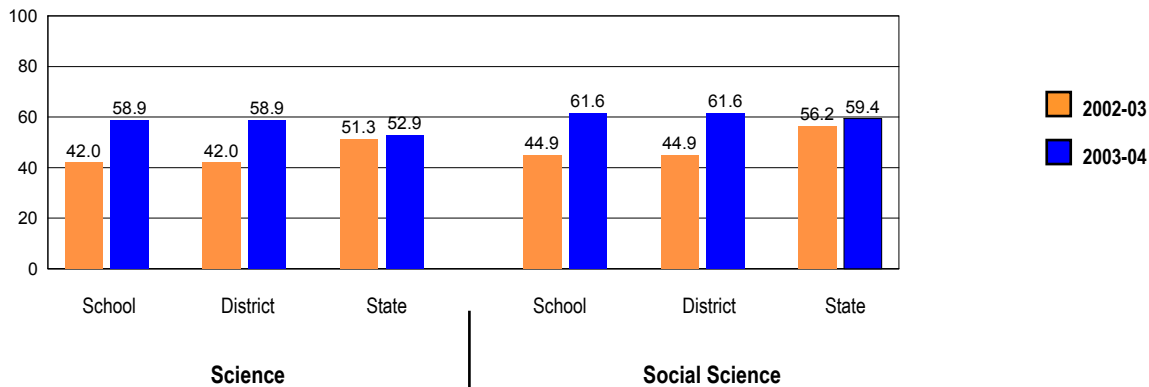

PERFORMANCE ON STATE ASSESSMENTS

Federal law requires that student achievement results for schools providing Title I services be reported to the general public.

The Illinois Standards Achievement Test (ISAT) is administered to students in grades 3, 4, 5, 7, and 8. The Prairie State Achievement Examination (PSAE) is administered to students in grade 11. The Illinois Measure of Annual Growth in English (IMAGE) is administered to students in state-approved transitional bilingual programs. The Illinois Alternate Assessment (IAA) is administered to students with disabilities whose Individualized Education Programs (IEPs) indicate that participation in the ISAT or PSAE would not be appropriate.

Students with disabilities have an IEP (No Child Left Behind Act). An IEP is a written plan for a child with a disability who is eligible to receive special education services under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.

Schools with grade 2 as the highest grade in the school use a state-adopted test in reading and mathematics to meet this requirement.

In order to protect students' identities, test data for groups of fewer than ten students are not reported.

PRAIRIE STATE ACHIEVEMENT EXAMINATION (PSAE)

The following tables show the percentages of student scores in each of four performance levels. These levels were established with the help of Illinois educators who teach the grade levels and learning areas tested. Due to rounding, the sum of the percentages in the four performance levels may not always equal 100.

Level 1 -- Academic Warning - Student work demonstrates limited knowledge and skills in the subject. Because of major gaps in learning, students apply knowledge and skills ineffectively.

Level 2 -- Below Standards - Student work demonstrates basic knowledge and skills in the subject. However, because of gaps in learning, students apply knowledge and skills in limited ways.

Level 3 -- Meets Standards - Student work demonstrates proficient knowledge and skills in the subject. Students effectively apply knowledge and skills to solve problems.

Level 4 -- Exceeds Standards - Student work demonstrates advanced knowledge and skills in the subject. Students creatively apply knowledge and skills to solve problems and evaluate the results.

Three Conditions Are Required For Making Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP)

1. At least 95.0% tested for Reading and Mathematics for the All Group and Subgroups. If the current year's participation rates are less than 95%, the participation rate for AYP will be considered sufficient if the average of the current year and the preceding year is at least 95%, or if the average of the current year and the two preceding years is at least 95%. Only actual participation rates are printed. If the participation rate printed is less than 95% but 'Met AYP' is 'Yes', it means the 95% condition was met by averaging.

2. At least 40.0% Meeting/Exceeding Standards for Reading and Mathematics for the All Group, and at least 37.0% for all Subgroups to compensate for error in measurement for smaller subgroup sizes, or meet Safe Harbor requirements***

3. At least 89.0% Attendance Rate for Non-High Schools or at least 66.0% Graduation Rate for High Schools

* Includes only students enrolled as of 9/30/03.

** Safe Harbor Targets of 37% or above are not printed.

*** Subgroups with fewer than 40 students are not reported. Safe harbor only applies to subgroups. In order for safe harbor to apply, a subgroup must decrease by 10% the percentage of scores that did not meet state standards from the previous year plus meet the other indicators (attendance rate for non-high schools and graduation rate for high schools) for the subgroup. Safe harbor allows schools an alternate method to meet subgroup minimum targets on achievement.

Planned Improvement for Carrollton High School

School Improvement is an ongoing process at Carrollton High School. During the summer of 2003, a team of teachers, administrators, parents, and community members created a two-year school improvement plan. The following goals were created from school improvement data.

Goal #1:

Increase academic achievement in language arts by 10% over the next two years.

Where we are:

- The Gretchen Courtney Reading comprehensions program has been initiated at the high school during the 2003-04 school year.
- A cross-curricular reading program as been implemented during the 2004-05 school year into all curricular areas utilizing a reader's handbook.

Goal #2:

Increase the academic achievement of those students who are at-risk, who do not meet academic expectations as measured by PSAE, by 10 % over two years.

Where we are:

- Reading scores have improved by 15.4% since the 2002-03 school year.

Goal #3:

Improve the communication on all levels of the school district (faculty and staff/administrators/ community) by 20% over a two year period as measured by pre and post surveys.

Where we are:

- Communication has been improved through parent and faculty newsletters.
- We are working to improve parent/teacher conference attendance.

Success has been evident with the drastic rise in PSAE scores. Reading has been the primary focus of school improvement over the last year.
